The film studies programs at area 4-year colleges also tend to do well. In fall 2012, there were twenty-two former WCC students enrolled at EMU in their Electronic Media-Film Studies program. By leveraging our existing courses and adding two additional film courses, we can develop a program that will prepare students to seamlessly enroll in a 4-year school, prepared to complete their last two years of upper-level studies.
